Noun Phrases

What is a noun phrase?

A noun phrase is a phrase which includes:

- 1. a noun (also called head)
- 2. and optionally modifiers.

Examples:

- Love is a beautiful feeling. (Love is a noun phrase without modifiers. However, a beautiful feeling is a noun phrase that includes a noun, feeling, and the determiner a and the adjective beautiful)
- *My house* is over there. (*My house* is a noun phrase which consists of the noun *house* and a modifier the possessive adjective *my*)

Possible noun modifiers

A noun phrase may optionally contain noun modifiers. If these modifiers are placed before the noun they are called **pre-modifiers**. However, if they are placed after the noun, they are called **post-modifiers**. Possible noun modifiers include the following:

1. Determiners:

- <u>articles</u> (the, a),
- <u>demonstratives</u> (this, that)
- numerals (*two*, *five*, etc.)
- possessives (my, their, etc.)
- <u>quantifiers</u> (some, many, etc.).

In English, determiners are usually placed before the noun;

2. adjectives (the delicious food)

3. <u>complements</u>, in the form of a prepositional phrase (such as: *the student of physics*), or a That-clause (*the idea that the world is a small village*)

Functions of a noun phrase

Noun phrases can function as <u>subjects</u>, <u>objects</u>:

- 1. *That sophisticated woman* is beautiful. (*That sophisticated woman* is a noun phrase that functions as a <u>subject</u>.)
- 2. I like the book that you bought. (the book that you bought is a noun phrase that functions as an <u>object</u>.)
